### The Visitor in Court

In one of the Spanish-American countries where official sentiment was bitter against religious work, one of our evangelists was arrested and thrown roughly into prison. His Bible and books were taken from him. Ere long came his day in court. The following account is abbreviated from the report given by E. E. Androssk president of the Inter-American Division:

Sternly the judge demanded to know what this man was teaching. The evangelist saw his own Bible on the court desk, and asked permission to read his teaching from the Holy Scriptures. He read the ten commandments, as spoken by the voice of God. As he began to read the words of that holy law, he noticed the judge's countenance change. He was looking intently beyond and above our evangelist's head. There was an expression of startled fear on his face and the reading of God's law continued.

When the reader stopped, the judge's eyes were removed from the object of his intent gaze, and were turned in questioning to the prisoner. "Who is the man who came in with you? And where has he gone?" the judge asked. "No one was with me," replied

the accused. “Yes, there was some one, taller than you, who stood behind you looking at me as you read,” said the judge. “But he is gone!” And turning to the police officer, the magistrate directed that the evangelist be set free, and be no more interfered with.
